"Ambulance, police – everybody was involved in it. There were people being carted off to hospital," recalled the Edge Hill woman.

Ms Knight said behaviour in the CBD had improved dramatically since her "baptism of fire" three years ago.

"We were always busting up

said. "Now if we do a first aid, it's usually self inflicted somebody who has had too much to drink or taken a drug they shouldn't have.

"People are much better behaved, it's much quieter."

Ms Knight joined the street chaplains at the urging of her pastor, while Angela Harding found her calling while surveying the city on her morning jog through Whitfield.

"I would pray for the city and I would pray particularly for our tourists," she said.

"When I found this opportunity to get involved with the street chaplains I thought

give to the city and support the city'. That was my motivation for getting involved and my desire is just to see our city being a safe city.

Working with emergency services, security guards and taxi marshalls, Ms Knight believes street chaplains have achieved just that.

"We can really see the difference on the streets since we've been out there," she said.
