## Guardians of street a year old

THE men and women behind a service committed to making the streets safer for revellers in the CBD has celebrated 12 months on the job.

The Cairns Street Chaplains have reflected on the year that was, having helped more than 500 partygoers safely get home since their inception in November last year.

"We love what we do," Cairns Street Chaplains program director Carol Christopher said.

"We get a lot of satisfaction out of helping people.

"What's more satisfying is that in a few weeks or months down the track, we run into these people again and they're in totally different circumstances.

"They've learnt their lesson and they're no longer indulging in alcohol. It's just a huge change in their life."

The all-volunteer group patrols the CBD every Friday and

"We're often asked if it gets dangerous on the street and I say, 'Only if we get hugged to death'," Ms Christopher quipped. "People are so appreciative of what we do.

"They just love having us

out there." Ms Christopher said she wanted to double the current number of chaplains from 18 to 36 and was counting on state government funding to establish a Rest and Recovery centre in the CBD.

"The idea will be that people can be brought to the cennecessarily get in trouble on the streets," she said.
