Sunbus goes cash-free

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Drivers refuse fares today as part of union action

PASSENGERS on Cairns Sunbuses today may receive a pleasant surprise.

About 100 of the city's bus drivers will be refusing to accept payment for fares as part of a fair work protest.

The drivers, who are part of the Transport Workers Union (TWU), are taking part in the action in a bid to have fair pay rises and working conditions.

TWU Queensland branch secretary Peter Biagini said the

strike, while still sending a message to Sunbus and TAG Australia.

"This form of protected action, the non collection of fares, is the least disruptive action that drivers can take," he said.

"We hope that we can sign an agreement soon and end these actions, but it won't happen until our members are satisfied that they have not only

action would prevent a full reasonable, but also secure, wages and conditions."

He said neither Sunbus nor TWU were ready to budge from where they stood on wages and work conditions.

'While there has been some productive meetings between Sunbus and TWU members, with both sides making some concessions, there hasn't been enough done to allay members' concerns about their rates of pay," he said. "Sunbus needs

to sit down with TransLink and work out a proper way to give these drivers what they deserve.

Sunbus Cairns general manager Bob Osmond said negotiations had reached a standstill.

"We regret that we are at an impasse in our negotiations with the TWU, despite our every effort to negotiate in good faith and reach a reasonable agreement," he said.

He said the strike action TWU held last week left people in Cairns high and dry without transport around the city

"Tomorrow's refusal to collect passenger fares is another example of the TWU orchestrating pointless action, rather than negotiating in good faith towards a reasonable outcome," he said.

"We have been left with no choice but to apply for dispute conciliation through the Fair Work Commission before further action damages our business beyond repair.'

Today's work action follows last Friday's stop work action, leaving only two Sunbus services to cater for those in Cairns reliant on public transport.

Unlike last week's protest against current wages and working conditions, today's action will not negatively affect Sunbus passengers.

Setback for casino ambitions

PLANS for a regional Queensland casino project have been dealt a new blow as another Chinese-owned developer says it is no longer interested.

Hong Kong casino billionaire Tony Fung's withdrawal in August of the \$8.15 billion Aquis project in Cairns from the state's mega casino-resort building scheme raised expectations it would open the way for fresh bids.

But a previous rival to Aquis, resort developer Fullshare Group, says it has chosen not to bid if a new round of licencing opens. Fullshare, which owns the Sheraton Mirage resort at Port Douglas, was one of 12 applicants in 2014.

Fullshare Brisbane manager Helen Hei said it had viewed Aquis' withdrawal as an opportunity.

But, she said, it had decided on a "direction change" for its Laguna Quays resort south of Proserpine to "health and wellbeing" after "numerous international discussions" about casino opportunities.

State Development Minister Anthony Lynham yesterday said the Government may go back to the market to seek expressions of interest, but had not yet made that decision.
